

## January Petit Jurors Hear First Trial Monday

Jurors for the January Petit Jury have been drawn as the first jury trial of the new term begins Monday. The case involves an accident damage suit which happened in Delaware in 1964.

The new jury will hear the case of Fred Lowry, 34 Spencer St., Delaware, vs. Loyal K. Enz and his son, Bruce E., of Prattville, Ala. Lowry is suing for damages totaling \$25,814.72, the result of a rear-end collision on S. Sandusky St. June 25, 1964.

In his petition, Lowry claims that Bruce Enz, then 18 years old, struck his car in the rear as he was stop-

ped to make a left turn off Sandusky into the Dairy Creme parking lot at 339 S. Sandusky. Due to the medical expenses which he allegedly incurred because of the accident, Lowry claims the court should grant the money judgment based upon Enz' alleged negligence.

The trial will start Monday morning at 9:30 in the county court room. Jurors drawn to serve the January term on the county Petit Jury include Ned Fletcher, Charlotte Ruth Emrick, Charles Earl Hess, Harold William Decker, Joe Arnold Krim, and Ronald J. Bryant from Sunbury.

Three persons with Galena addresses are included on the January list. They are Donna Ruth (Continued on Page 2)

## BW Board to Meet Twice Each Month

Big Walnut Board of Education will meet twice each month because of the increasing amount of school business. The decision was made by board members in their organizational meeting Jan. 4.

In addition to continuing their regularly stated meetings, the first Tuesday in each month, board members expect to meet the third Monday of the month, unless otherwise stated. Time for the meetings is set at 8 p.m. October through March and 8:30 for all other months.

Clyde Cochran was re-elected president of the board as was Neil Perfect to the vice presidency. Cochran has held the post since 1962, while Perfect will be beginning his second term as vice president.

Other board members, all of whom have served at least one year, are Mrs. Joan Lawrence, Sam Reppert, and Richard Wetherbee.

## Stanley Wins Stay From Supreme, Not Appeals Court

Ohio Supreme Court granted Charles L. Stanley a temporary stay of execution two weeks ago and the Fifth District Court of Appeals, according to County Prosecutor Henry Shaw, Jr.

The news reported last week that the Appeals Court rendered the 20-day stay while Stanley and his attorneys waited to file for a permanent stay with the Ohio Supreme Court. However, Shaw corrects, Stanley is presently on his way to the U.S. Supreme Court with a writ of certiorari, i.e., asking that tribunal for a re-examination of his case which was heard in Delaware County Common Pleas Court in October, 1968.

Prosecutor Shaw further states that he, in the name of the county, is "opposing any further stays of execution" in the Stanley case. Stanley was convicted on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon and sentenced to three years in the Ohio Penitentiary in 1968 and has been appealing the verdict since.

## First Twenty Called In 1971 Draft Lottery

Delaware County Selective Service has a call for 10 Inductees and 25 for physicals for Jan. 21, according to Miss Margaret E. Lawrence, county clerk.

Lottery numbers from January will go from number 001 through 020 of the 1971 lottery. Those with numbers from 001 to 194 of the 1970 drawing have extended priority; but, according to Miss Beck, none of these were available at this time.

Those boys who were deferred in 1970 and having numbers up to 194 will be drafted first as soon as their deferments run out. If there are not any available from this category, then the draftees are drawn from the 1971 lottery.

## NEW YEAR BRINGS DEADLINES FOR COUNTY CITIZENS TO HEED

With the coming of the new year, county citizens must be aware of many deadlines within the coming months. Dog tags, real estate taxes, trailer taxes, and personal property taxes come due and the News offers this timetable for payments:

Both dog tags and kennel licenses must be purchased from the Auditor's office before the Jan. 20 deadline. Tags cost \$2.00 apiece and kennel licenses are \$10.00. House trailer taxes must be paid by Jan. 31. This tax applies to all trailer owners with units within the state.

Real estate taxes are due Feb. 20 and Treasurer Madge Conklin will be sending out statements Friday and Saturday. Mrs. Conklin tells that she will again have a collection day in Sunbury for the eastern part of the county. She presently sets Feb. 10, a Wednesday, as her collection date outside the courthouse office.

# No Weekend Traffic Deaths Keep County Toll at 21

## NUMEROUS ACCIDENTS PLAGUE HOLIDAY; 1970 FATALITIES INCREASE OVER 1969

Delaware county numbered 21 fatalities in the nation's toll for 1970, according to the State Patrol, as that office alone investigated 1,512 accidents throughout the year. The year's fatalities increased by one over those totaled in 1969.

Figures filed at the patrol office on US 23 tallied 17 fatalities in 13 fatal accidents investigated while the county sheriff's department investigated one accident with a single fatality and the Delaware police department had three separate fatal accidents.

## Two Remains in Hospital

One of the last accidents in 1970 in the county investigated by patrol sent two men to the hospital Thursday evening. Clifford Fleming, 31, 3425 Peachblow Rd., and Clarence Brooks, 40, Galena Rd., were both taken to Jane Case Hospital by De Vore with head injuries and Fleming was then transferred to University Hospital in Columbus.

Their injuries were incurred in a one-car accident at 4:45 p.m. New Year's Eve as Fleming, the driver, lost control, struck tree stumps and flipped on Lewis Center Road. The accident demolished Fleming's Volkswagen and he remains in fair condition in University while Brooks

is in good condition in Jane Case. Fleming was not cited by the patrol.

## Other Weekend Accidents

Several accidents occurred early New Year's Day. According to the sheriff's department, Catherine Likousis, 25, Centerburg, lost control of her car while traveling on SR 521 at the intersection of CR 65 in Kilbourne at 2 a.m. Friday.

The report stated that Miss Likousis apparently came upon a curve too fast and overcorrected her steering, flipping the car into the ditch. She was slightly injured and her passenger and brother, Larry, were not injured.

At 2:30 a.m. Friday, the patrol investigated an accident on SR 605 about 3 miles south of the SR 37 intersection. Lewis Kinney, 32, Centerburg Rd. 1, was slightly injured when he tried to avoid a deer and was struck by another car.

## Industry Carries Big Slice of Tax Load

Taxes paid by the four large industries of this part of eastern Delaware county pay a big slice of the operating expenses of both villages and schools. The Galena Shale Tile & Brick Co., Bry-Air, Inc., Inland Finishing Co., and The Nestle Co. pay taxes on a total valuation of \$4,586,400.00.

Unofficially, this means that Big Walnut Schools derive approximately \$132,088 in taxes from the plants. Galena Village gets about \$2,511 and Sunbury Corporation receives approximately \$7,257.

Galena Shale Tile & Brick pays taxes on a valuation of approximately \$456,700. Bry-Air, Inc., pays on a valuation of \$16,250. Inland Finishing Co. has a valuation of about \$143,430. Nestle Co. of Sunbury has a valuation of approximately \$3,870,000.00.

## Election Board Director Discusses Technical Aspects of Lowering Age

County Election Boards from all over the state gathered in Columbus Sunday, Monday and Tuesday to meet with Secretary of State Ted Brown. One of the key issues discussed pertained to Congress's recent passage of the 18-year-old vote.

Delaware County Board Director Josephine Lawrence told the News the discussion focused upon the implementation of the election in the county level. Although some discussion pointed to the possibility of 18-year-olds voting in all elections, no concrete action was taken concerning a statewide lowering of the voting age.

Congress's bill enables 18-year-olds to vote in races for national candidates only, the next election for which will be in 1972. Provisions for lowering the voting age for state and local issues and candidates were left completely up to the individual states themselves.

Mrs. Lawrence told that Secretary Brown emphasized that the bill also does not allow 18-year-olds to run for an office. And, unlike the law pertaining to persons who will be the individual states themselves.

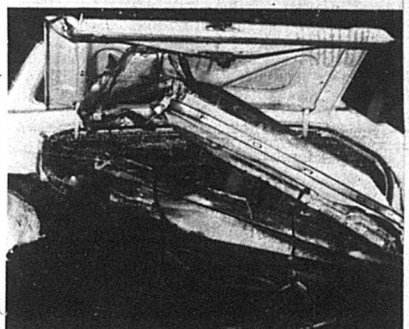

## Big Walnut Board Faces Critical Shortage of Funds

Big Walnut School District is beginning the year with \$34,476 in its general fund, the lowest year-end balance since 1962. Clerk J. W. Buckingham told the board of education at its January meeting. Several factors are responsible for the lower balance, school officials said. The district has increased costs for salaries, but has not necessary repairs and improvements to keep the district's buildings functioning. Low tax revenue by default (both private and public utilities - Penn Central), and the loss in amount of state foundation funds this year.

Following the re-appraisal of property, Big Walnut's foundation funds will hit by a 1/2-1 mill charge-off as part of the state's policy of equalization grants.

Well, my good friends, this is January and usually all budgets are feeling the pinch. With the extra expense of Christmas and then following closely the collection of taxes, everyone tightens his belt in January. That means find as many dishes as possible that are inexpensive—right?

I think if everyone else put on the pounds like I did during the recent weeks, we should all go on a diet anyway!

**Hamburger—a Stretcher**  
We used to think hamburger stretched our dollars. I'm not so sure anymore; seems hamburger is pretty expensive, too. However, if you want a good dish using hamburger, try these:

**Quick Swedish Meatballs**  
2 lb. ground beef  
2 c. soft bread crumbs  
23-oz. pkgs. cream cheese  
1/4 c. dry onion soup mix  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 t. nutmeg  
2 1/2 c. milk  
2 T. all-purpose flour

Thoroughly combine meat, bread crumbs, cheese, soup mix, nutmeg and 1/2 c. milk. Shape into about 40 small meatballs. Brown lightly in large skillet, shaking skillet to keep meatballs round. Cover and cook about 20-25 min. Remove meat; drain off excess fat, leaving 1/4 c. in skillet. Blend flour into fat; stir in remaining milk all at once. Cook and stir till thick and bubbly. Return meatballs to gravy and heat through.

Note: To make even-sized meatballs, pat meat mixture into a rectangle, then cut in squares. Roll each square into ball.

**Frankfurters Can Stretch Budget**  
Another meat, really not so cheap

anyone, is the frankfurter. I remember when I was a child, butchers would give the kids winners or franks to eat raw. They certainly don't give them away now! I'm sure your youngsters would like these for lunch.

**Franks in Foli**  
2 c. finely chopped frankfurters  
1/3 c. shredded sharp processed Am. cheese  
2 hard cooked eggs, chopped  
3 T. chili sauce  
2 T. pickle relish  
1 t. prepared mustard  
1/4 t. celery seed  
8 frankfurter buns, split  
Combine all ingredients except buns. Fill buns with frank mixture. Wrap each securely in foil. Place on baking sheet; bake at 400 degrees for 15-18 min. Makes 8 sandwiches.

**Another Frank Dish**  
Here is still another dish which you might like using franks. It's quite so acid as franks and sauerkraut.

**Franks and Cabbage**  
4 c. coarsely cut cabbage  
4 frankfurters, cut into 1" pcs.  
2 T. butter or margarine  
2 T. all-purpose flour  
1 c. milk  
1 T. prepared mustard  
Cook cabbage, covered, in small amount of boiling salted water 5-6 min. or 'til barely tender; drain. Place in shallow 1-q. baking dish. Arrange franks on top. Melt butter and blend in flour and 1/2 t. salt. Add milk all at once; cook and stir till sauce is thick and bubbly. Cook 1 min. longer. Stir in mustard. Pour sauce over franks. Heat in moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 20-25 min. Make 3-4 servings.

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—ORDINANCE NO. 582  
AN ORDINANCE FIXING RATES AND CHARGES FOR WATER SERVICE TO THE VILLAGE OF SUNBURY, OHIO, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHER USERS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary and advisable to establish certain rates and charges for water service to be rendered to the Village of Sunbury, Ohio, and to its inhabitants and other users which will provide sufficient revenue to pay the operating and maintenance expenses of its waterworks system and to provide for the payment of and extending and improving said waterworks system;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Council of the Village of Sunbury, Delaware County, Ohio, three-fourths of the members elected thereto concurring:

Section 1. That commencing January 1, 1971, the following shall be the rates charged for the supply of water services by said waterworks system:

Minimum Charge First 4,000 gallons, per quarter, \$5.52. Next 20,000 gallons, per quarter, \$1.10 per thousand gallons. Next 20,000 gallons, per quarter, \$1.10 per thousand gallons. All over 40,000 gallons, per quarter, \$1.10 per thousand gallons.

The foregoing charges are minimum, not maximum, charges and the Village reserves the right and is obligated to increase the same at any time should the revenues of the waterworks system prove insufficient to pay the operating and maintenance expenses and extending and improving said waterworks system.

Section 2. Should the bill for any service rendered by the waterworks system remain unpaid for a period of sixty (60) days, such water service shall be cut off and such service shall be resumed only upon payment by the user of an additional fee of \$4.00.

Section 3. The owner of private property which is served by said waterworks system by pipes connected with said system to convey water thereto, shall, as well as the lessee of the premises, be liable to the Village for all water from said system used, upon said premises.

Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure in that the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Village require improvements and extensions of the waterworks system and the establishment of revised rates to support the financing of the cost thereof, and it shall take effect and be in force upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

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## Facts, Figures for 1971 Farm Program Available Now

Most of the facts and figures that local farmers need to plan their 1971 cropping operations are available now at the Delaware County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, according to Earl Ward, chairman of the County ASC Committee.

"The new farm law provides a program that will be very helpful to farmers really interested in farming," Mr. Ward said. "With most planning limitations removed, we expect to enroll some farmers now who couldn't afford to take part in past programs. Dairymen and cattle and swine feeders who have needed practically all their cropland to produce grain needed for their livestock may now find it practical and profitable to take part in this new set-aside program."

Basic provisions of the program were explained during a meeting in Marion recently by members of the Ohio State ASC Committee and staff. Mr. Ward attended from Delaware, along with Earl Musard and Clyde Liming, commit members, Dale Sauder, county executive director, and Bernadette Kaehler, program assistant. Also at the meeting was Robert Irvin, county extension agent.

Mr. Bauer of the State ASC Committee explained goals of the set-aside program as to protect and improve farm income, improve farm operators' ability to make sound farm management decisions, and promote conditions that will make it possible for farmers to depend on the marketplace for a reasonable price for their crops.

County ASC Committeemen also heard that the new program will protect farm income with price support loans - \$1.08 per bushel for No. 2 corn and \$1.25 per bushel for wheat (national average figures unchanged from last year). Price support payments for corn and wheat may be earned in 1971 without regard to planting a specific acreage.

They also learned that the set-aside program is considered as a logical progression from past programs that limited most farmers in their management decisions through the system of rigid grain base acreage and wheat allotments and that improved market pricing conditions should enable U.S. farm commodities to better compete for foreign sales, and against domestic substitute food products.

Operating details of the program of immediate interest to local farmers include the following, Mr. Ward said.

The set-aside acreage for corn (and grain sorghum) will be no larger than 20 percent of the feed grain base established for the farm.

The set-aside acreage for wheat will be no larger than 75 percent of the new "domestic" wheat allotment. Growers who will not have their allotment reduced for not planting wheat in past years can estimate their "domestic" allotment as 33 percent of their 1970 allotment.

To improve farmers' ability to specialize in crops that provide their greatest chance for profit, corn may be grown in place of wheat or wheat for corn. This substitution provision is familiar to most growers, Mr. Ward said.

While soybeans may be classed as a substitute for either wheat or feed grain under the new program, it is not expected that this provision will be in effect during the 1971 crop year unless the Secretary of Agriculture determines this necessary to avoid a shortage.

Payment rates will, as in past programs, be based on the individual farm's feed grain base and wheat allotment, and the yield established for the farm on those crops. Preliminary payments will be made soon after July 1. Total payments due by October 15 will be based on the average price for the first five months of the marketing period for feed grain and wheat.

The target price for corn has been set at \$1.35 per bushel and at full parity for wheat grown on the "domestic" wheat allotment.

Minimum preliminary payment rates have been set at 32 cents per bushel for corn and at 75 percent of the estimated value of marketing certificates for wheat.

Growers can estimate the payments they can earn from these programs by multiplying the average feed grain base in acres times the yield per acre times 32 cents.

For wheat, the "domestic" wheat allotment multiplied by the average 75 percent of the face value of a marketing certificate. Certificate value may be estimated at this time as the difference between the average support price, \$1.25 per bushel, and parity price, currently \$2.82.

All details for the individual farm will be provided by March 1 to sign up scheduled for March 1 through April 9.

The sign-up will begin later than in past years, giving farmers more opportunity to base their participation on the best possible plans for planting.

## Corn Liability Crop Insurance Limit Is Set

Limitations on 1971 corn insurance liability were announced today by H. K. James, Ohio State director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. "Because of present uncertainty as to the effect the corn blight may have on 1971 corn yield," Mr. James said, "we are limiting the amount of new insurance we will write on corn crop investments for the 1971 crop year."

The liability limit has been set at no more than a 50% increase over the 1970 crop year liability in each county where Federal Crop Insurance on corn is available.

For the 575 counties where FCIC writes insurance on corn, total coverage in 1971 can't exceed \$225 million, up from last year's \$150 million.

"Current Federal Crop Insurance policy holders will not be affected by the limitation," James said. "But 1970 policy holders who have cancelled their policies for the 1971 crop year should restate at once."

After we reach our liability limit, we will not be able to accept re-statements from former policy holders."

In most counties where Federal Crop Insurance is available on corn, protection is also available on soybeans and wheat. There will be no limitation on the amount of insurance for these crops, James reported.

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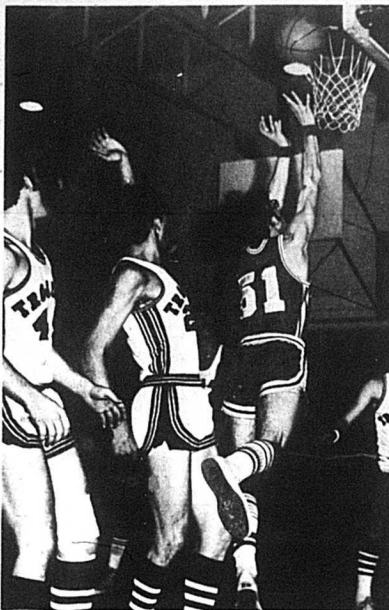
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# Eagles Crack Centerburg 88-49 With Record 70% Shooting

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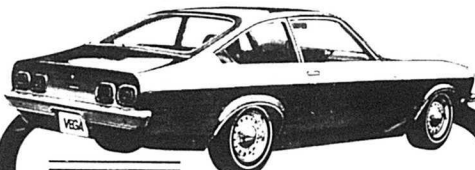

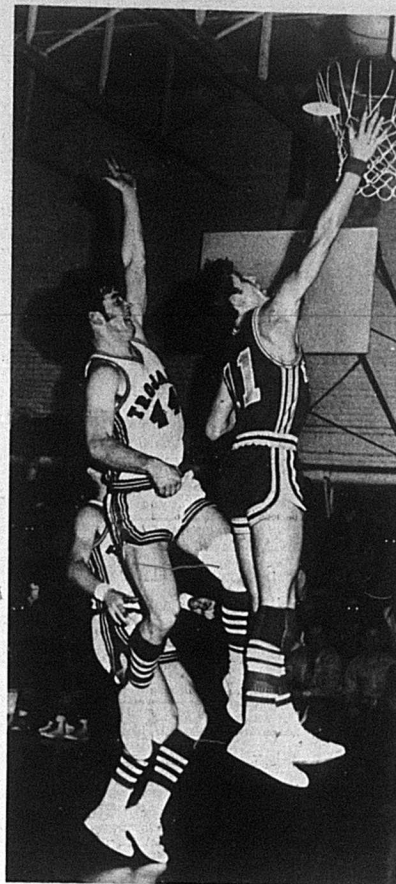

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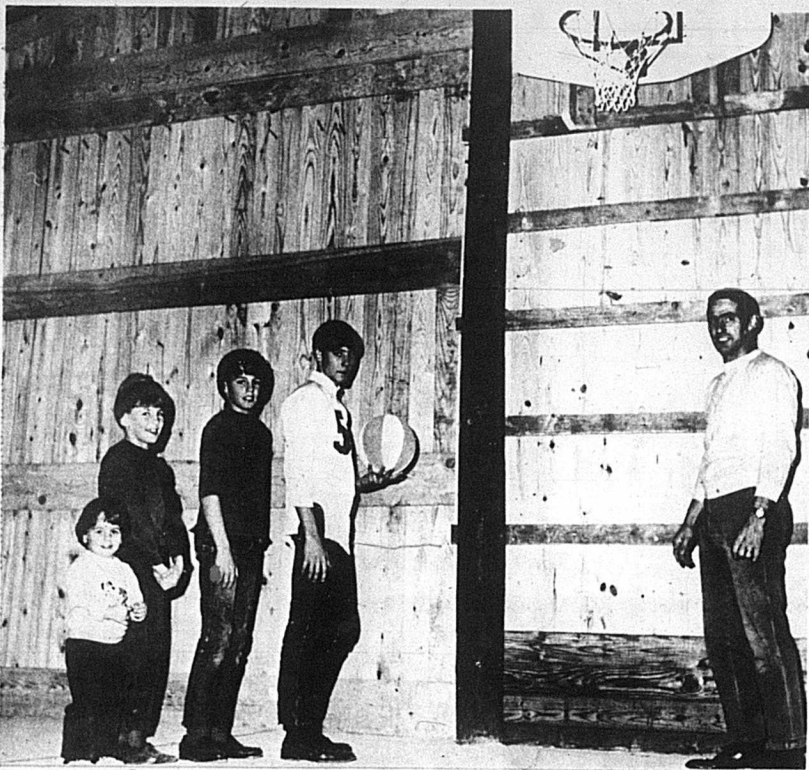
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### What a Christmas Surprise — A New Basketball Court

## Management Practices Yield Efficient Production

Soils respond to good management. We have all heard the expression, "If I had soil like his, I could grow 130 bushels of corn, too." Chances are that kind of soil just didn't happen.

Soils respond to good management that consists of more than applying lime and fertilizer. Lime and fertilizer are very important but some times basic management concepts are forgotten or overlooked.

Basic considerations like drainage, proper plowing at the right moisture conditions, soil structure, soil erosion, available water, compaction, and slope will affect the crop growing on the land.

A soils map of the farm provides much information about the soils such as the natural drainage, the amount of topsoil, the slope, the texture of the soil and the subsoil conditions. Knowing these things about the soils will make management decisions much easier. All the soils in Delaware county have been mapped and information is available at the SCS office.

Water management practices go hand in hand with proper tillage and soil management for efficient production. Water requirements of Delaware county's major crops reach their peak during grain development for corn, soybeans, and small grains and during period of rapid plant growth or regrowth after harvest for forage crops. Research data from USDA studies at Coshocton have shown the following average amounts of water used during the growing season: corn, 20-22 inches; wheat, 12-15 inches; and meadow, 22 inches.

In order to supply adequate moisture to growing crops, practices which increase water intake by the soil and reduce evaporation losses, such as some form of minimum tillage, must be used.

The basic philosophy of conservation farming is to grow crops that are best suited to a given soil condition and to treat the soil in accordance with its needs.

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## Time to Build Nesting Structures for Woodduck

Now is the time to erect woodduck nesting structures. If you have a farm pond and are interested in having Ohio's number one waterfowl utilize your pond, try erecting a woodduck nesting box this winter on your pond. Cut a hole in the ice at the shallow end of your pond; drive a steel post and bolt a woodduck nesting box to the steel post approximately two feet above the high water line. Place approximately 3-4 inches of wood shavings in the nest box for nesting material. The woodduck nesting box should be erected before March 15 since the nesting usually starts the last of March and the peak of the hatch occurring in May and early June. For detailed information on construction write to: Ohio Division of Wildlife, 1500 Dublin Road, Columbus, Ohio 43215 or contact your county game protector for publication W-109 and W-37.

### Ice Safety Facts Important

Knowledge of ice safety (cold facts) can save lives. Ice fishermen and others engaged in activities on ice should be guided by the following ice safety facts reports the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Wildlife.

1) Slush ice is about one-half as strong as clear, blue ice. 2) River and stream ice is about 15 percent weaker than lake or pond ice. 3) Sudden application of brakes increases weight pressure of a vehicle. 4) Continuous travel over the same route

on the ice will weaken it; 5) The removal of snow from the ice surface will usually increase the thickness during subsequent freezes; 6) Two inches of ice will support one man on foot; three inches - a group of people in single file, seven and one-half inches - a car or truck (two gross tons) and 12 inches - a heavy truck (eight gross tons); 7) Ice thickness is not always an accurate measure of its strength or safety; 8) New ice is stronger than old, and ice formed by direct freezing of lake waters is stronger than that formed from melting snow; 9) Ice may be weakened by continual pressure; 10) During certain conditions of high wind velocity, ice may break loose regardless of its thickness.

Knowledge of and respect for the above "cold facts" will enhance safety and reduce apprehension, thus making your holiday on ice more enjoyable.

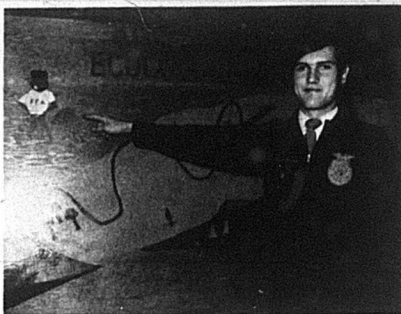

## Board Shortens Day for Big Walnut School Students

Students in Big Walnut School District will be coming home approximately 20 minutes earlier for the remainder of the school year following action by the Board of Education during its regular January meeting.

The earlier dismissal time is an intermediate solution to the problem of having too long a day for elementary school children, board members said. The new schedule goes into effect Monday, Jan. 11.

Supt. Hylen Souders and Transportation Coordinator Estel Miller met in December with Herman Masie, supervisor of pupil transportation for the state, and Arthur Crisp, area coordinator, to try to work out a solution to the length of day which is complicated by transportation schedules.

"This is a common problem for districts such as ours," Supt. Souders told the board. "We are spread out over such a wide area—110 square miles—that it takes about 50 minutes for each bus to complete

runs." Big Walnut buses roundhouse schedules in order to transport its students, so each bus makes two of these 50-minute runs each morning and two more at dismissal time.

Teachers and parents had asked the board to amend the present schedule which kept kindergarten through fourth grades in school until 3:50 or 4 p.m. each day. Souders told the group that "what we are presently doing is probably the most feasible and economical plan, but we recognize that this does create a long elementary day."

The problem was further complicated, as the board and visitors learned during extensive discussion and consideration at the meeting, by the length of school day at various grade levels.

Board members emphasize that the shortening is a temporary measure to relieve the situation for the rest of the year while board and administration continue to work toward a permanent solution.

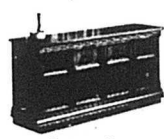
